President's Report

Dear members,

Once again the last three months have been busy for the Society and our volunteers.

In addition to our regular open days and booked tour groups, at the request of Campbelltown Council, volunteers were on hand to open up Glenalvon House, and prepare and serve Devonshire teas, for Council's Senior's Festival and International Women's Day Open Day event, on Sunday 10 March. Thank you to all the volunteers involved in making these days a resounding success.



The Council is making good use of Glenalvon these days. The Council events team opened up the grounds on the evenings Friday 22 and Saturday 23 March, for families to sit, catch up and celebrate Ramadan. These evenings were very successful, by all accounts. A big thank you to Council staff, who did a fantastic job cleaning up the grounds after both evenings of this event, and the Society was still able to open for the Saturday open day and member's meeting, with some limited access issues.

Council also arranged for petting zoos to be at the back of the gardens for the 14th and 21st April Sunday Market Open Days, the latter coinciding with our Open Day, which was also very popular and profitable for the Society.

In relation to other events, the Society was represented at the Appin Massacre Memorial Service at Cataract Dam on Saturday 14 April, it was a beautiful day and service, for a somber event in Australia's history. Please see Sue Kijurina's article about this service, later in this issue. Members were also present for this year's Anzac Day dawn service, at Mawson Park.

As reported in the last issue of *The Kernel*, the Society had put together a display about the Koshigaya Sister City relationship, which celebrated 40 years in 2024. With the kind assistance of Ruth Banfield and Mark Annetts, more information, photos and objects about the Sister City exchange program, Koshigaya Park and Campbelltown Park (in Koshigaya), were installed in the display room for the 2024 Heritage Festival.

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As Glenalvon House is about 185ish years (give or take), the house and grounds do require a bit of TLC. Recently Council's maintenance team arranged for restoration work to be carried out in the Servant's Quarters. More details about this work, and thanks to all involved, can be found later in this issue.

The Society received a delivery of archival storage boxes and albums, from Albox, on 9 April. These items were purchased using grant funding the Museums & Galleries NSW, and will provide better access and protection for parts of our archives and photographic negatives collections.

Anniversary of the Appin Massacre

On the 17th April, President Stephen Coppins, Mario Majarich and Sue Kijurina attended the very moving Memorial Ceremony honouring the Dharawal people at the 208th Anniversary of the 1816 Appin Massacre. There was a smoking ceremony, explanations of the significance of the memorial spoken in indigenous language and in English, singing and dancing followed by tributes from the Indigenous leaders, local Mayors and Council representatives. A very soulful morning followed by a great BBQ lunch, supplied by volunteers, amidst very proud indigenous people from various groups and their supporters

Captain James Willis leader of the Grenadiers of the 46th Regiment wrote in his diary of the deaths of Aboriginals, some being shot, and many men, including an old native Balyin, along with women and children who rushed over the cliffs near the site of the Cataract Dam today. Many who survived from the Gundungurra, D'harawal & Dharug nations were driven over the mountains, in response to Macquarie's orders, were imprisoned or went into hiding. Launch of the Grist Mills

The second story in this journal, *Life in Oxley Street in the 1950s*, was written by Robert Penfold, whose family lived at 3 Oxley St when they first came to Campbelltown. Many of us would know him as Channel Nine's American news correspondent and I am pleased to add, has recently been 'home' to receive an Order of

Australia for his contribution to journalism, the broadcast media and mentoring young journalists.

Since Robert was unable to attend the launch, he deputised his sister Carolyn Stewart to speak on his behalf.

It was perfect weather for an outside event, and, as always, had the welcoming feeling of people chatting, occasionally reconnecting with others and showing that the old Campbelltown community ties still exist.










Au Revoir... For Now



At the Members' Meeting on Sat 25 May our Guest Speaker was member John Morthen and the topic, Campbelltown's POW: the WW2 Story of Robert Goodear.

John had come across some boxes of photos and documents about Roy Goodear that allowed him to build up an interesting profile on this returned serviceman.

While not living in Campbelltown in his early years, Roy, like many others settled here in the 1950s.

He had served in the Australian Navy in the 1930s before being discharged: joining the Army at the start of the war. He was one of the famed *Rats of Tobruk*.

John Morthern is passionate about most things to do with Australian war history and has been a volunteer with the CAHS for many years, but after his talk members learnt that John will be moving on for a while, taking an exciting professional opportunity in Japan.

John has been asked to write something about his time with the Society and career so far, and his future plans, which is included below, without edit:

I started volunteering at Glenalvon in August 2019 during the first year of my university studies, a Bachelor of Heritage, Museums and conservation. I initially worked as a tour guide under Dennis Roach (the man, the myth and the legend!). Since late 2021 I have worked full time at the Liverpool Regional Museum, and admittedly have slacked off in my volunteer duties, but still hold a soft spot for the house.

Over the past years and a half, as you mentioned, I started preparing for my upcoming move to Japan. I successfully applied for the Japanese Exchange and Teaching Program (JET) and from July 28 I will be moving to Sapporo City to work as an Assistant English Teacher in schools. This move was driven by my love of history, and especially a love of modern East Asian history, which you may have guessed based on my passion and talk of the Korean War. I think this move will have a drastic change on my life as it will mark my first time living alone and in a totally alien country, but it is a change I am optimistic about and will tackle head on. I'm sure over the next year or two I will have many glowing reports to send back to the society. John M.


