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### A Previous Visit From the RAHS

Campbelltown News, Fri 3 July 1942 reports the visit HISTORICAL SOCIETY VISITS CAMPBELLTOWN.

Last Saturday afternoon, June 27, a party of some fifty or sixty members of the Royal Australian Historical Society visited Campbelltown. The party, led by the President, Mr. A. E. Stephen, and the General Secretary, Mr C. Price Conigrave, visited numerous points of historic interest throughout the town.

After having lunch in Mawson Park, the party visited St. Peter's Church of England where they were welcomed by the Rev. J. F. Rofe, who pointed out that the church would be celebrating its

119th Anniversary the following day. Mr. Morris then gave a brief outline of the history of the church, and also mentioned that John Warby, James Tyson, and Frederick Fisher are buried in St Peter's cemetery. The lecturer told the story of Fisher's Ghost, and then presented the historical facts of the case.

On-leaving the church, the party inspected various historic buildings in Queen Street, the lecturer giving a brief history of each one in turn.

Returning to Lithgow Street, Mrs. Bursill's residence, "Glenalvin Hall" was inspected.

The Presbyterian Church, which will be 100 years old on July 10th, was then inspected and after outlining the history of this church, the lecturer told the history of St. John's Roman Catholic Church. It was regretted that time would not permit a visit to this old church.

After expressing pleasure at having had the opportunity of visiting Campbelltown, the party left on the 4.15 p.m. train.

# St Patrick's College History Club

A huge congratulations to Fran Musico-Rullo, Jo Cavillin and the girls at St Pat's.

Students at St Patrick's College for girls have taken out first prize in the National Anzac Day Schools' Awards for a passion project through which they recorded the stories of local servicemen and women, then built a website to publish their research.

In addition to taking out the top spot in the competition run by the Department of Veterans' Affairs, these students were awarded the Brigadier Bill Rolfe AO award for veteran involvement.

The student-led project titled, *Our local veterans: discovering, recording and reflecting on stories of service,* was completed outside school hours by members of the school's history club and aimed to preserve the first and second hand stories of service personnel.

The girls conducted 14 interviews with veterans and their families. Interviewees were invited to bring an object from their military service to discuss and were asked a range of questions, including about the challenges they faced during and after their service.

Many of the military personnel were parents or relatives of the students and the girls reflected on how the project helped them view their family members in a new light.



Particularly poignant is the interview Year 8 student Hope Schwarze conducted with her grandfather, John Matthew Purkis, who served in the military for 19 years, including in the Vietnam War.

Year 12 student, Caitlin Reynolds, documented the story of her great-grandfather, Harley James Daley, who was 34 years old when he enlisted in WWII in 1940.

While serving, Daley was captured by Japanese soldiers in Malaysia. He spent four years in brutal POW camps, including the infamous Changi.



As a Warrant Officer, Daley was responsible for 200 Allied soldiers in Changi prison and risked his life documenting his experiences in a diary which he buried each day.

Upon returning home, Daley resumed his former position with Ingleburn Municipal Council, which was later amalgamated with Campbelltown Municipal Council.

He made a significant contribution to the local area, helping to facilitate Campbelltown's transformation from a small country town to a burgeoning city.

#### Donald Gordon NASH (1938 - 2024)

This year marks the 200<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the famous Hume and Hovell expedition which set out from Hume's farm on the Appin Road on the 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1824. One of the party, chosen by Hamilton Hume, was Irish convict James Fitzpatrick (1800-1882), who came to Australia in 1822 and was assigned as a servant to the Hume family.

Donald Nash was a direct descendant of James Fitzpatrick through his grandmother Elizabeth Susan Fitzpatrick (1873-1957) and his mother Elizabeth Sedgwick (1900-1980), who was known as Bess or Bessie Nash. She would be remembered by many of our older members for her community work, particularly with the Camden-Campbelltown Legacy Torchbearers. She was elected Vice-President when it was founded in 1946, becoming President in 1960.

Donald Gordon Nash was born 86 years ago to Bess and Jack Nash (married 1933) who were dairy farmers along Camden Road on the Camden side of the road where the Macarthur Centre for Sustainable Living is located, on Mount Annan Drive. He had two sisters – Margaret (m. Robert MacAllister) and Barbara (Doble) who with her husband Robert also lived for a time on the home property.

Don grew up on the "Birriwa" farm in an area known from the early 1800s as Pratts Bush. They specialised in Ayrshire cattle which were plentiful in the Camden area last century. One of Jack's young stock of the Birriwa stud was awarded Junior Champion Ayrshire bull at the RAS Easter Show in the 1960s. Don and Colleen lived on the farm as well as their parents. The dairying operation concluded in June 1969 with the sale of all their stock through William Inglis & Son. Jack died four years later and Don ran beef cattle on the property while he worked in Campbelltown. He also enjoyed running (including marathons) and could be seen along the Camden Road jogging when we were boys on nearby Gowrie farm.

Don became a milk vendor in Campbelltown, delivering to the Allman St, Bradbury Avenue and Hoddle Avenue areas. He also made grocery deliveries with the milk trucks during the day, including Coles when it opened on corner of Queen Street and Dumaresq Street. His last job was working at the local Dairy Farmers Co-Operative Milk Distribution Depot on the other side of the railway line.

In November 1967 Don married Colleen Beacham and they have enjoyed 46 years together, with four children – three boys James, Andrew, Matthew and a daughter Elizabeth. There are 11 grandchildren. Don and Colleen retired off the farm in 2003 to live in Canberra.

Don had a respect for God and the family notice in the SMH quoted the words of St Paul (2 Timothy): 'He has fought the good fight, he has finished the race, he has kept the faith.'

We extend our condolences to Mrs Colleen Nash and to all the family.

#### Eve MITCHERSON (February 1932-July 2024)

We knew her as Eve but she was Eva Lillian Jarrett born in Wagga Wagga in February 1932.



At age 17 she moved with her family to Campbelltown driving along the Hume Highway in a 1937 Ford Ute, living first in Kentlyn. With encouragement from family, Eve decided to become a hairdresser and did her apprenticeship at *The Master Ladies Hairdressing Academy* in Sydney. After receiving her certificate Eve worked for Monica Rixon in *Monica Beauty Salon* in the *Athelstone* Building in Queen Street. At this time Eve was living in *Richmond Villa*.

Eve met John Mitcherson at Cecil's garage when he was working for Mr Wilkinson the plumber. Eve and John married on 6<sup>th</sup> September 1952 at St. Peter's Anglican Church.

They moved into a house in Rudd

Road and raised 4 children; daughters Kerrie, Kim, Deborah and son David.

John was an electrician and electrical repairman in Ingleburn and tells of the time they had the first television In Ingleburn and people stood in the street in the evening to watch the TV in the window.


During this time Eve had completed a course in Floristry and was able to take a job as a teacher of floristry at the first evening college at Campbelltown High School.



They eventually moved to Randolph Street to a small home built by Merv Jensen. Eve stayed in this home until she went into care.

Daughters Kim and Debbie also trained to be florists.

The first florist shop was in Railway Street in 1972, also John and Eve bought some land in



In the 1980's the business had grown so they moved to a shop in the Madison Arcade, Queen Street. They also opened a Bridal Shop upstairs in the arcade.

John passed away in 1997

Eve was active in the community as a member of St. Peter's Church Guild, Campbelltown Quota, Soroptimists, Campbelltown & Ingleburn Show Committees as well as our Society, being a member since 2007.

Eva Mitcherson passed away on 28<sup>th</sup> July 2024 and a celebration of her life was at St Peter's Church on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> August. The flowers in the church were arranged by her daughters and were absolutely beautiful – Eve would have approved.

#### Everard Joseph D'ARCY (23/02/1929-27/08/2024)



In his own words, Everard D'Arcy had "a long and strong history in the town of Appin, both in farming and community. My father opened Appin's first petrol and service station in 1927, and supplied mechanical services, water delivery, tow trucks, coal trucks, earthmoving equipment, as our establishment was a major hub of the town's activity. My father even established the Appin Rural Fire Brigade in1944; in fact, we were an integral part of the fire brigade, providing our water tankers!"

And while he may be telling of his father's achievements, they also reflect his own achievements.

Everard spent all of his life in Appin, the eldest son of Joseph D'Arcy; with his family going back nearly 200 years in the area. Three of his great-great-grandfathers had land grants as early settlers of Appin, including Lawrence D'Arcy of Spring Valley Farm.

Most people will know of J D'Arcy & Sons on the corner on the main road in Appin, and will think of how often they travelled past Darcy's corner on the way to and from the coast. Joseph D'Arcy, with his sons Everard and John built the garage in 1927. Both sons were qualified mechanical engineers.

Everard knew Deidre Percival all of her life, partnered her at her 21<sup>st</sup> birthday ball in Campbelltown, they were married in 1968 and had three children: Joanne, Adrian and Chantelle.

Everard gave strongly to the community, being a member of the Appin Rural Fire Service for 75 years; the garage was a meeting place for a long while and the place people would often come to report fires even after the brigade had its own building.

Campbelltown Picnic Races was held for many years as a charity event to raise money for the hospital Campbelltown so urgently needed. The races were held on the Darcy property, another support for the local community.

He was also a member of Quota club and, of course, Campbelltown and Airds Historical Society, always having a strong passion for history.

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Glenalvon is open from 9.00am to 1.00pm, Mondays and Tuesdays (except Public Holidays), for members to use the library and archives or to help with collections, displays, gardening and other duties around the property.
