
Dear members,

I would like to congratulate **Fran Musico-Rullo**, **Alley Rullo** and **Andrew Allen**, along with the staff and students of St. Patrick's College History Club and the Campbelltown City Library Local Studies Team, who were presented the 2024 Anzac Day Schools Award (National Winner) and the Brigadier Bill Rolfe AO Award for Veteran Involvement, on 2 December. What's the time?

This must've been an important question on the minds of the settlers that moved North into Hokkaido (Japan's Northern most Island) as the Sapporo Clock Tower is the oldest building still standing in the city.

Following the restoration of the emperor in 1868, the decision to establish power over Hokkaido was set in motion. At the time, Hakodate (which I shall explore next time after I have visited its spectacular fortress) was the regional capital. However, it was determined a new city must be established which could better project influence over the land. The City of Sapporo was founded and became an agricultural frontier settlement. One of the first projects undertaken was the construction of an agricultural college in 1871 under the guidance of American professor Dr. William S. Clark who oversaw the development of the farming industry.

But who was going to farm this land, and furthermore, who would defend it? Hokkaido was very much the frontier and Russia, having already claimed Sakhline to the North, had its eyes on the vast and fertile land. It was decided that Tunda Soldiers (Frontier Soldiers) would be

used in the new colony. "One soldier and a farmer", essentially a citizen soldier as we would know them in Australia, they were farmers who would maintain a high level of military training. These were recruited from the ranks of former Samurai, who following the restoration of the emperor, were left jobless.

With the Tunda soldiers in place, they needed somewhere to train them. In 1878, the construction of a Drill Hall at the Agricultural college was completed. But the poor souls still had no idea what time it was, and so within a month of completion a clock was ordered and by June the following year a tower housing the device had been added to the main hall structure, thus creating what has become an iconic symbol of Sapporo.

The Clock Tower remained a Drill Hall but also went on to be a centre piece of the college's education, functioning as a lecture hall, as well as for civic events and balls. Over the decades, its use was replaced by more convenient locations, and eventually the old clock tower became little more than a reminder of the past frontier settlement. Today the Clock Tower is open to the public most days and is very well preserved. Its clock still ticks but many who need to know the time now prefer to look towards the far more visible TV Tower located in Odori Park (the equivalent of Sydney's Hyde Park).

'Our local veterans-Discovering, Recording and Reflecting on Stories of Service

The Anzac Day School's Award is a national competition conducted by Veterans' Affairs, recognising the work of students and teachers, in schools that engage with veterans and honour Australia's wartime history.

It is so pleasing to see the work St Patrick's College History Club, under the guidance of teacher, Fran Musico-Rullo, be acknowledged, winning this prestigious award.



Also of mention is Andrew Allen and Michael Sullivan from the Campbelltown Library Local Studies team, who supported this project, videotaping and participating in the interviews.

Each student compiled a biography, as well as learning interview techniques they developed research skills by accessing primary material from sources such as Trove and the National Archives.

Some students from years 8, 9 and 12 developed a website so the research could be accessed publicly and used by other classes in the College as a teaching and learning tool.

With the aid of a staff member, a photographic portrait was taken of each veteran.

Combining all these skills a booklet was created, given to guests as part of the presentation assembly.

The assembly was held in the Mary Sheill Centre on 2 December, 2024, to acknowledge the forty-two students, three teachers and 14 service personnel. They worked on the project during their free time in and after school, recording stories of local servicemen and women who served in all conflicts and peacemaking missions since World War I.

They were also awarded the Brigadier Bill Rofe AO Award for Veteran Involvement.

Many of the girls wore the replica outfits of the nurses from WWI and WWII setting the scene for the presentation.

Guest of Honour, British Deputy Consul-General Edward Kitt delivered the keynote address, speaking of his own grandfather's service in WWII while many other distinguished guests included Dr Mike Freelander MP Federal Member for Macarthur, Mr Greg Warren MP State Member for Campbelltown, Parliamentary Secretary for Education and Early Learning, Cr Darcy Lound Mayor of Campbelltown and Ms Alison McLaren Deputy Secretary representing Secretary, Department of Veteran Affairs, Canberra.

New Display

Jenny Goodfellow and Clarice Stretch) have been working to install two new displays.

In the Display Room, in the main house, you can see a display, featuring objects and information, about the life and service of Hubert Peter Lazzarini, Federal MP for Werriwa, for many years.



Hubert Peter Lazzarini (known as Bert) was the M.P. for the seat of Werriwa from 1919 to 1952 with a break of 3 years during the Depression.

Under John Curtin in 1941, Bert became Minister for Home Security and Minister assisting the Treasurer. In 1945 he shed the Treasury duties but gained the portfolio of Works. At this time his title was changed to Minister for Works and Housing where he administered the Commonwealth and State Housing Agreement to provide homes for low-income families.

Bert was succeeded in the seat of Werriwa by E. Gough Whitlam.

Hubert Peter Lazzarini died in 1952 and is buried in Liverpool.











In the Servant's Quarters you can see the Lazzarini Doll Collection. These dolls were collected over many years by Kathleen Lazzarini, granddaughter of former Federal MP Bert Lazzarini.
